



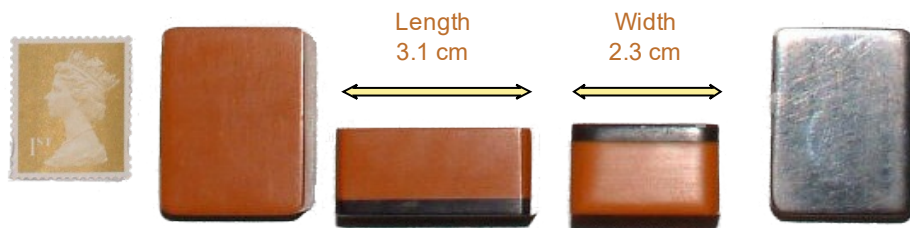

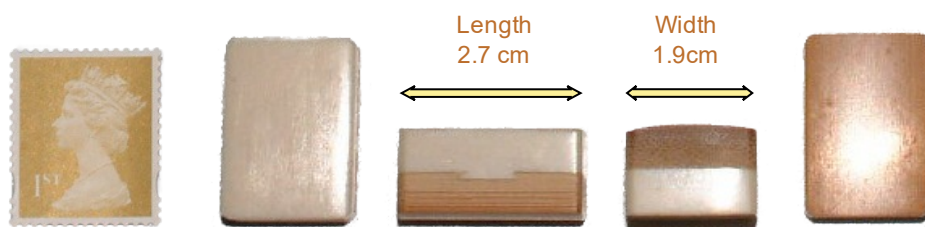
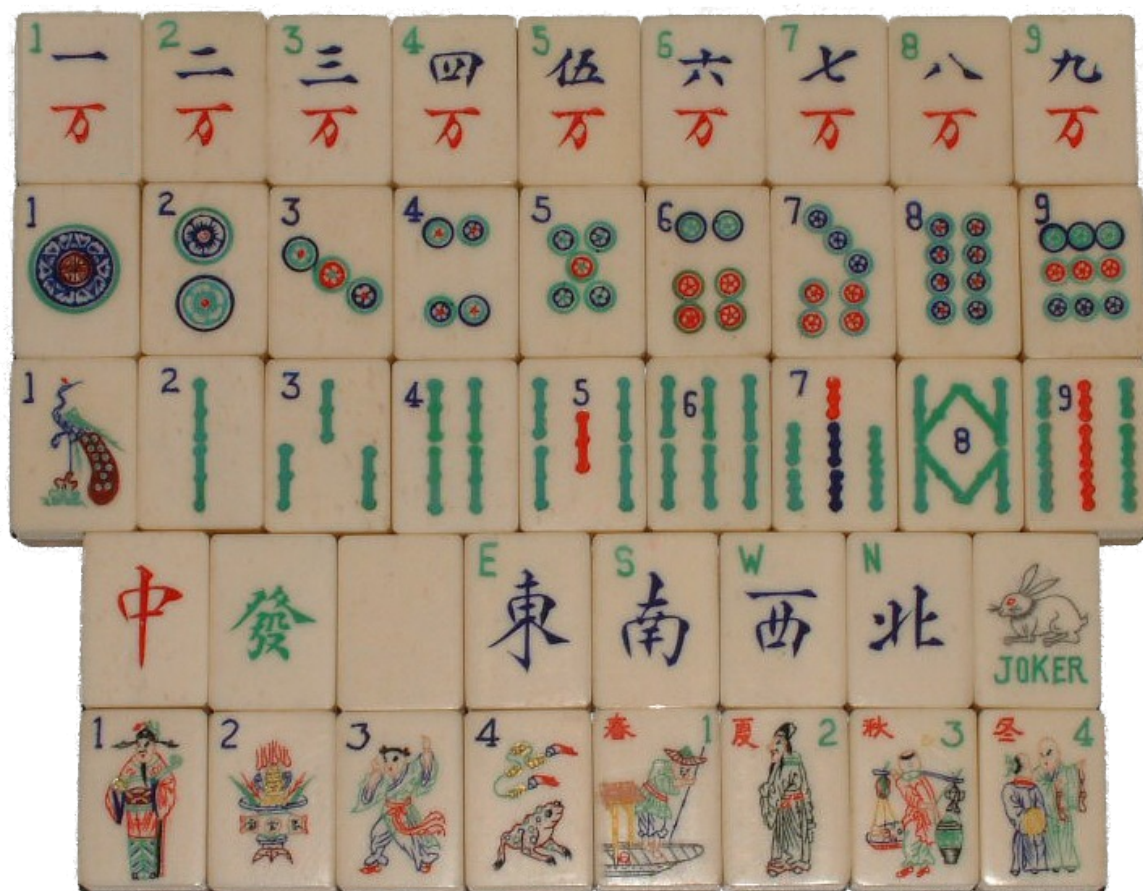
Mah-Jong set made from bone and bamboo  
Bought in a second-hand shop in North London in 1948 for £1



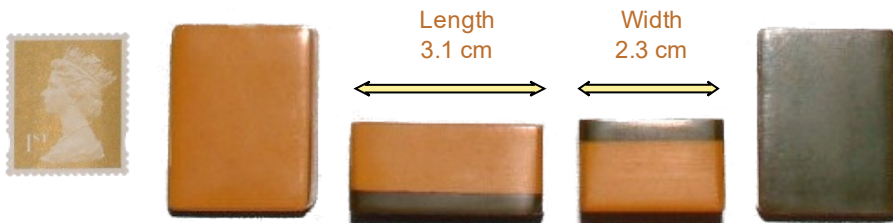
Mah-Jong set thought to be made from Bakelite. Bought in China in 1936.

Arabic numerals are not present as set was not intended for export.



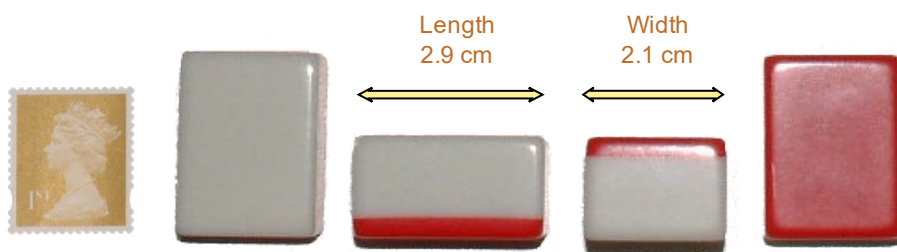


Mah-Jong set made from bone and bamboo.  
Bought in Selfridges, London in 1964.

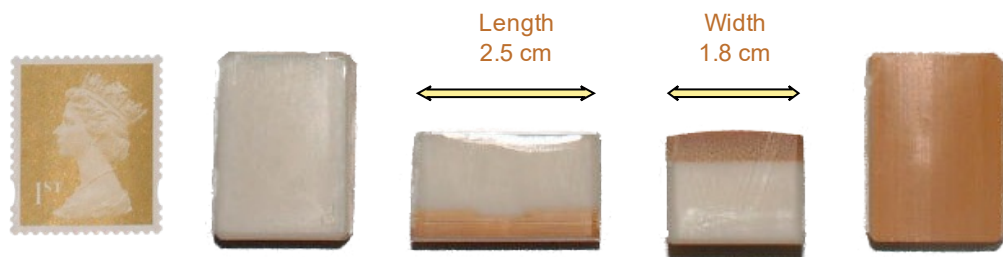


Mah-Jong set thought to be made from resin and Bakelite.  
Bought on eBay in 2003. Originally purchased in Shanghai.



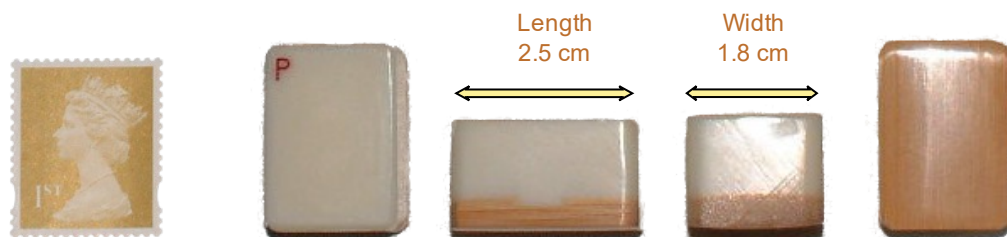
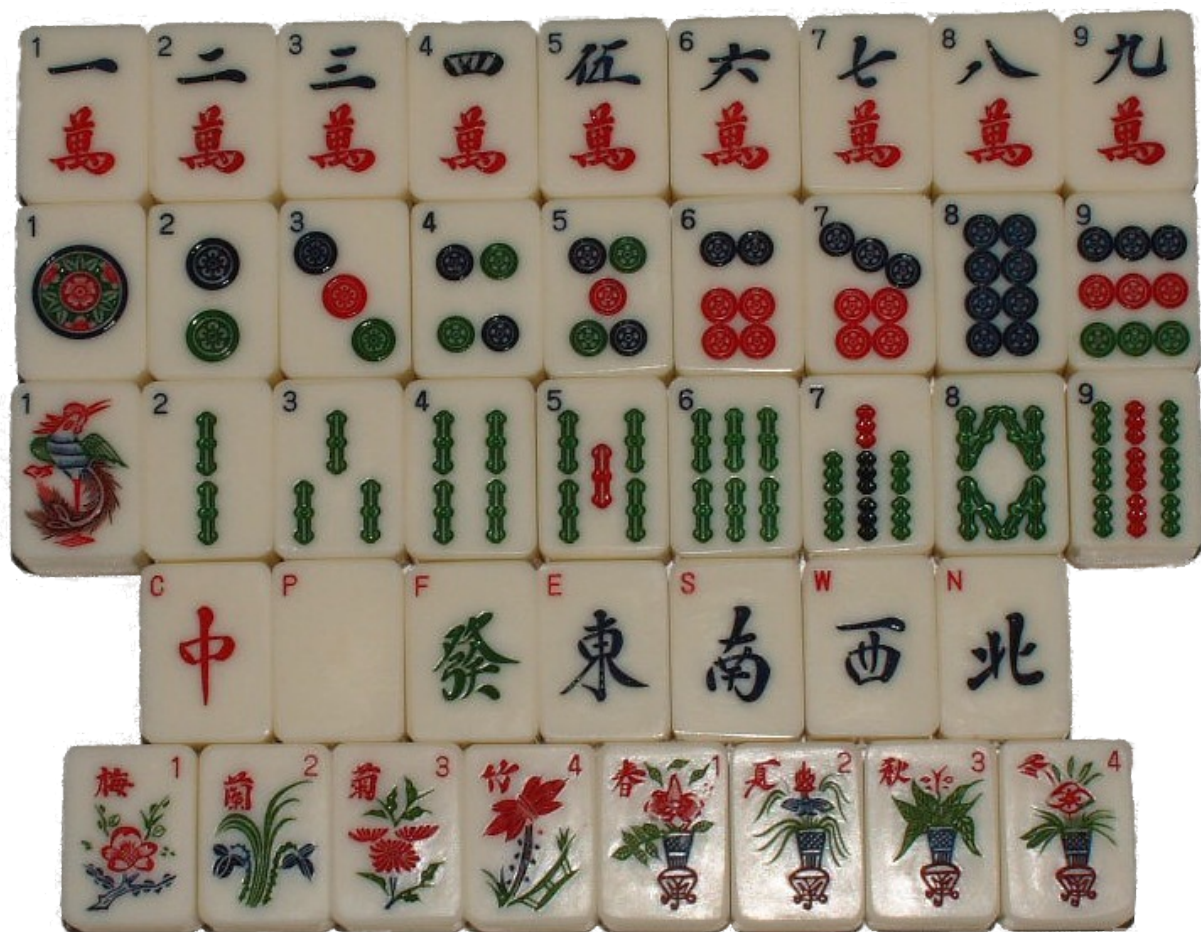


Mah-Jong set made from modern plastic.  
Bought in a John Lewis store in 2007.

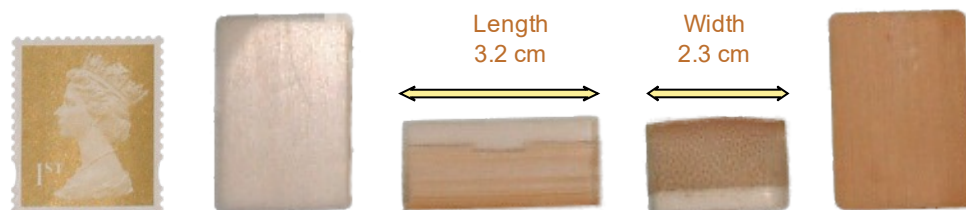
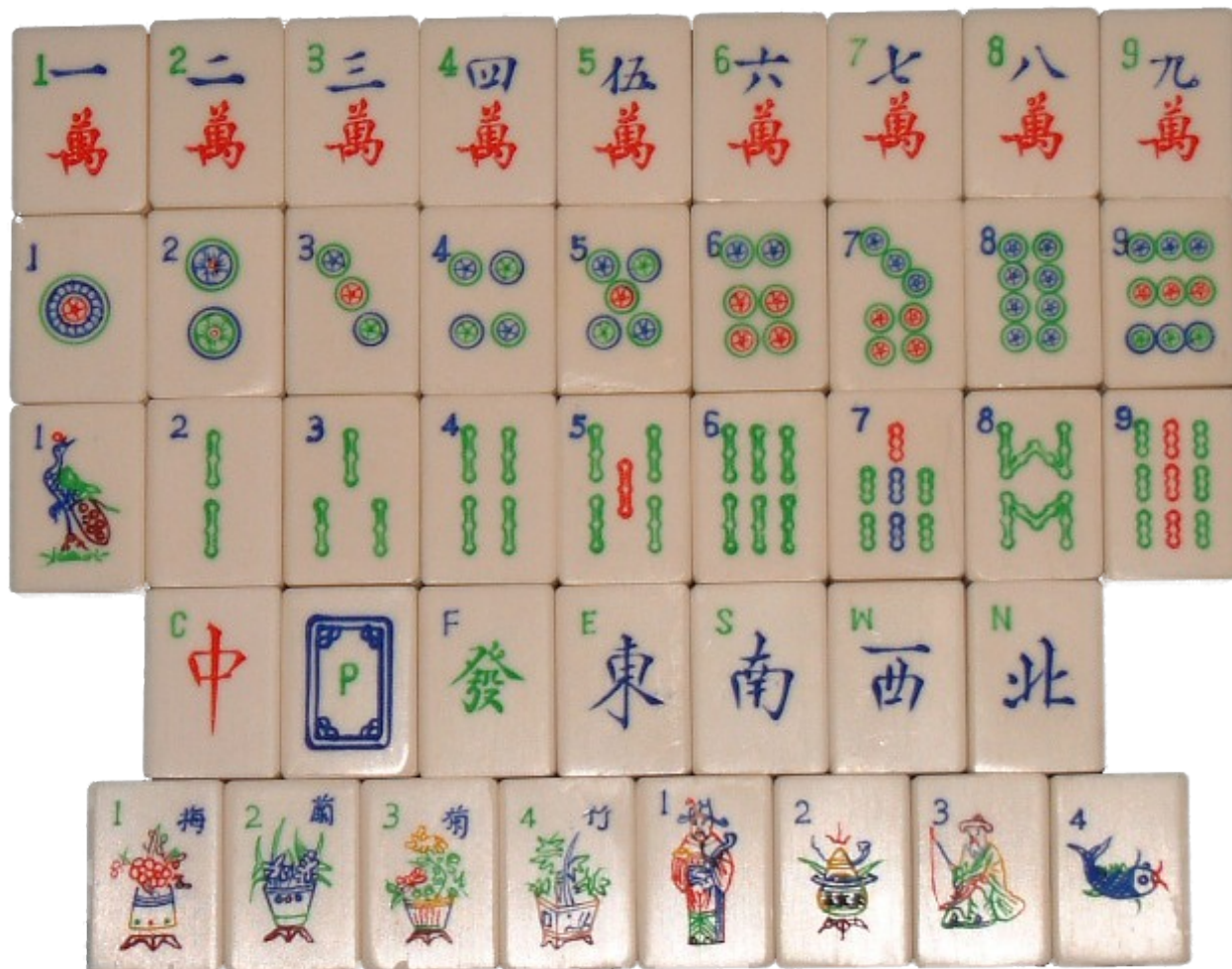


Mah-Jong set made from bamboo and modern plastic.  
Bought in a London store in the 1970s.



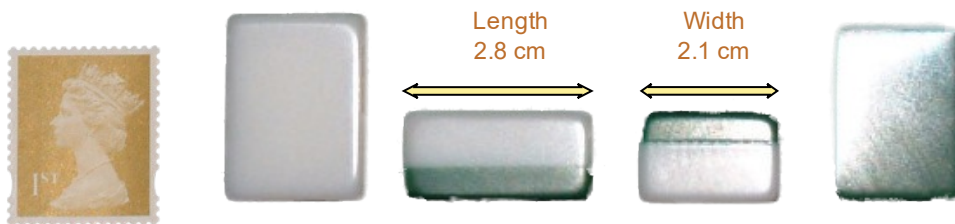


Mah-Jong set made from bamboo and modern plastic.

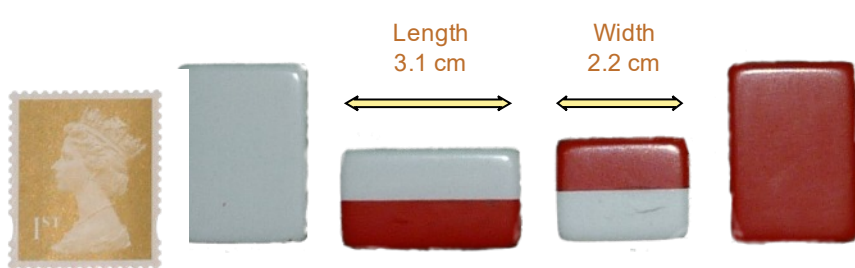


Mah-Jong set made from bone and bamboo.
